Thank you for being an integral part of our journey.







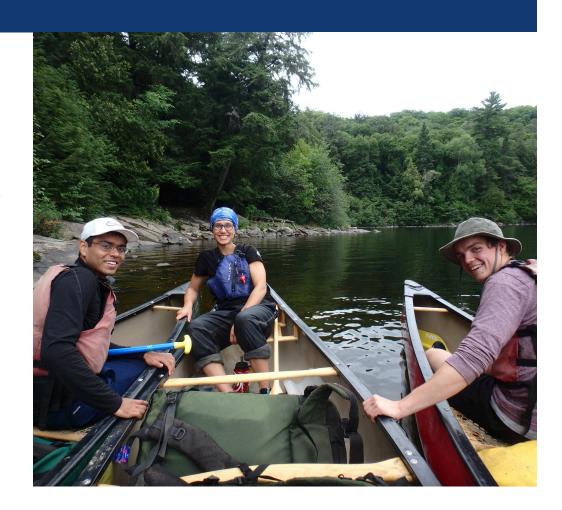

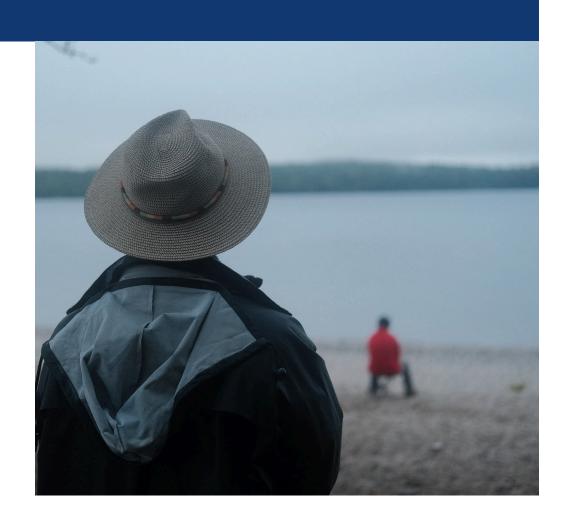


Testimonials

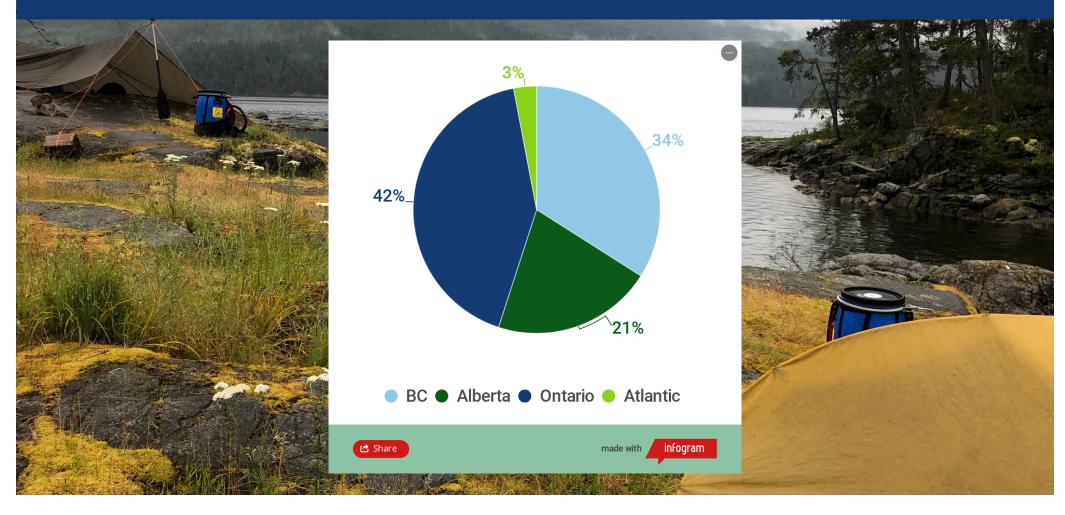

80 skilled outdoor professionals joined the workforce in 2022

The Training Academy for Outdoor Professionals, funded by the Government of Canada under the Sectoral Initiatives Program for a three-year period as an investment in the economic recovery of the outdoor sector, launched its pilot program in 2022.



In 2022, the Training Academy ran in Alberta, British Columbia and Ontario with 80 participants. Of these, 35% self-identified as BIPOC and/or 2SLGBTQ+. In 2023, the program will expand its reach to four regions across Canada with 10 programs and a goal of 200 participants.

The Academy aims to address the representation gap in the outdoor sector and provide exceptional training for outdoor leaders. The program trains participants at no cost to acquire the technical skills and strengthen their social and emotional competencies to become Canada's next generation of outdoor leaders.

We brought back our urban programs in Toronto and Vancouver

After having to suspend these programs in 2020 due to the pandemic, we were excited to resume our urban programs in 2022, bringing experiential outdoor education to hundreds of youth at our urban centres. These programs are an important stepping stone to introducing youth to outdoor education and facilitating access to nature for those who are developing confidence in their outdoor skills before moving on to wilderness expeditions.









Leaving the pandemic behind

As we move through the last couple years in which our risk management team was busy with COVID-19 protocols, we are still however seeing the legacy of the pandemic on the youth we serve. The effect of the pandemic won't go away anytime soon, as young people struggle with the aftermath of two years of social isolation.

The significant and potentially long-term impact on adolescent mental health highlights the need for immediate and research-based action. In our June 2022 position paper Help Me Out: How outdoor education impacts and empowers youth to thrive,

we summarized the research on how outdoor experiential learning can help youth develop the resilience and social-emotional skills they need to succeed. The paper also includes recommendations for building capacity in outdoor education to ensure that all youth have access to quality outdoor education.

We discussed these recommendations in an opinion piece we co-authored with the Conference Board of Canada, Youth outdoor education programs create strong social emotional skills, build resilience, published in the Toronto Star in August 2022.



2022 Reach Beyond Expedition in Haida Gwaii

Our youth weren't the only ones who went beyond their limits in 2022: In June, eight OBC supporters journeyed to the Haida Gwaii archipelago in British Columbia to participate in the Reach Beyond Fundraising Expedition. The trip was a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity for our supporters to overcome the physical challenge of crossing the open ocean and learn about Indigenous perspectives on the land. Together, they raised nearly \$40,000 for our youth programs.











Social Challenge

2022 was a challenging year for youth in Canada. From the affordability crisis, to the growing concern about the climate emergency, to the increasing understanding of the pandemic impact on mental health, good news sometimes seemed out of reach.

That's why, here at Outward Bound Canada, we did what we do best: We've focused on helping young people who have been hit hard in recent years get outside and have life-changing experiences in nature. We created new programs and funding opportunities, which allowed us to fund over 60% of our total youth served.



Thanks to your support, hundreds of youth benefited from our courses and support in 2022. They report that their resilience, confidence, leadership skills, and overall wellbeing have improved, and that they're more engaged with the environment and conservation.



Facts about youth in Canada today

Indigenous youth are at higher risk for mental health challenges due to the lingering effects of colonialism, residential schools, and intergenerational trauma.

Depression and anxiety have steadily increased in recent years, with **35%** of youth reporting anxiety and **25%** reporting depression.

2SLGBTQ+ youth are significantly more likely to experience **depression, anxiety, and suicidal thoughts** than other youth.

Lack of access to nature can contribute to social isolation, which is a risk factor for mental illness. In a 2019 survey, 43% of youth reported feeling disconnected from nature.

Social isolation was a major problem for youth even before the pandemic: in a 2019 survey, 23% of youth in Canada reported feeling lonely or socially isolated on a regular basis. In 2021, 61% of youth reported feeling socially isolated during the pandemic.

In 2022, **15%** of OBC participants identified as being within the 2SLGBTQ+ community, and **17%** described themselves as First Nations, Inuit, or Metis.

One in five youth aged 12-24 suffers from a **mental illness** in the course of a year.

A 2020 study found that youth who reported spending less time in nature were more likely to suffer from depression and anxiety. The study found that for every additional hour per week that youth spent in nature, they were 8% and 6% less likely to experience depression and anxiety.

Strengthened resilience

Our programs cultivate physical and mental well-being, equipping participants with resilience that will serve them throughout their lives.

Social and emotional skills for success in school, work, and life

We're committed to helping students overcome their limitations and reach their full potential. They become confident, cooperative, and courageous team players who form meaningful friendships and strong social bonds that last a lifetime.

Environmental responsibility

OBC programs foster a love and appreciation for the environment and instill in youth a sense of responsibility to protect and preserve it for future generations.

Resilience & Self-confidence

My experience has helped me realize my own strength and my ability to overcome obstacles. When I think back to carrying more than half my body weight on my back for over 8 kms, it reminds me how much I can do when challenges come. I've found that I'm more resourceful when it comes to my clothes and food. By getting by with just a few pieces of clothing, I'm now more aware of how to dress without being too consumed by consumer culture. Most importantly, I can say that I'm more in tune with myself because of my OBC experience."

Compassion for Others

It gave me a different perspective on how much we really need to survive. We're constantly bombarded with advertisements that create a sense of lack in us, but we're so privileged to want and then have all these things. Many people don't have the opportunity to experience nature in this way. The adventurous backcountry isn't accessible to much of the world. Many people live in poverty and have no choice but to live in cold tents and boil water to survive. Warmth, hearty food, clean water and toilets are necessities we take for granted. We also formed a **Justice**, **Equity**, **Diversity**, **Inclusion** and **Accessibility Committee** (**JEDI Access Committee**) to improve overall diversity, equity and inclusion, making the following progress:

- After analyzing the gaps in OBC culture and systems, we began to work collaboratively within the organization to address these issues the JEDI Access Committee is a result of this work.
- Thanks to funds donated by Gore Mutual, we've hired three youth advisors who have made significant contributions to our DEI initiatives.
- Our Human Resources team revised OBC's hiring practices to be more inclusive of marginalised groups, and the feedback from applicants has been encouraging. Of 15 key positions filled in 2022, seven identified as BIPOC and four identified as members of the 2SLGBTQ+ community.
- We established a 2SLGBTQ+ Task Force to increase the number of students in our affinity courses through various initiatives and strategies.
- The People & Operations team has identified a lack of clean data to make decisions and understand workforce trends, so in 2022 we developed a robust onboarding survey package for new employees to complete. This survey will allow us to capture demographic data, religious and cultural holidays, and dietary needs for group events.
- We have reinstated our weekly anti-oppression discussion group, where staff can share ideas and insights on topics related to anti-oppression.



There's much more to come in 2023, such as the introduction of affinity groups where staff can support each other and have access to specific resources, an access center for information and digital resources to raise awareness and support underrepresented groups, and many other initiatives.

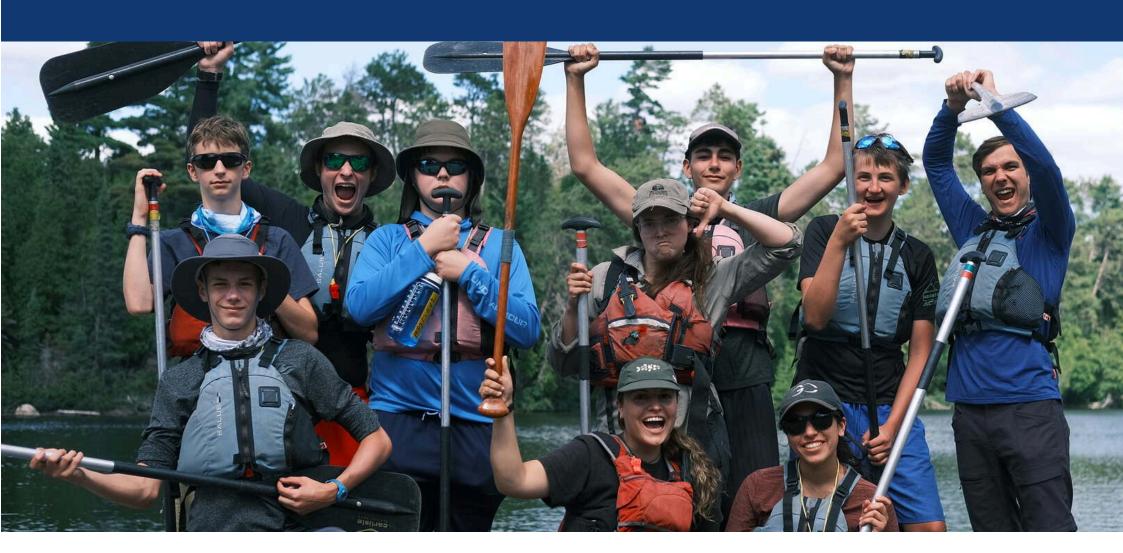
